
ACTIVITY



CONDOM CARD GAME

A card sorting activity illustrating effective condom use.

AIMS	TO INCREASE KNOWLEDGE OF AND CONFIDENCE IN CORRECTLY USING CONDOMS
TIME REQUIRED	15 minutes +
STAFF REQUIRED	2
PARTICIPANTS	Variable. 2 – 5 per card set
MATERIALS	Condom card set/s
	Condom card game facilitators guide
PREPARATION	Print enough condom card game sets (included in the resource kit) for activity. (Note the cards are double-sided to include questions).
	Print the condom card game facilitator's guide (included in the resource kit).

	Identify services where young people can access condoms and sexual health services and information.
ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION	This activity is about looking at the different steps that are involved in putting on a condom correctly. The game can be played in a variety of ways. Choose the option below that best serves your needs.
	Large group
	Provide participants with a card set and ask them to work as a group to place the cards in the correct order.
	Small group
	Make multiple card sets, divide participants into small groups, and have them race against each other to sequence their cards.
	Line up
	Hand out one condom card from the set to each participant. Ask them to arrange themselves in a line representing the correct arrangement. If you don't have 12 participants, give the cards to the whole group or more than one card to some participants.
	If you have more than 12 participants, print off some extra consent cards as they can easily be placed at multiple points of the sequence.

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FACILITATOR NOTES	Review card order, the questions on the back of each card, and the questions/answers on the condom card game facilitator's guide. Use these to help generate conversation.
	Discuss local services where young people can access condoms and contraception as well as sexual health services and support.
	Use this activity in conjunction with a condom demonstration activity.
